Some of the major events, which include the International Assembly, Pre-PETS, District Leadership Training, PETS and the District Assembly, have been completed. As the Presidents Elect and their clubs look into the future we find that the Future Vision Club Qualification work shops are right around the corner.

There are three work shops all are scheduled for Saturday mornings in different locations in the district. The first one will be held on May 1st from 9:00 AM – 12:00 PM, at the Somerville High School Library, the second on May 15th, from 9:15 AM – 21:15 PM, at the Memorial Hall Library, in Andover, and the third on June 12th, from 9:15 AM – 12:15 PM, at the Peabody Institute Library in Peabody. Rotary "Lights Up" Medford Seniors

On Saturday April 10, 2010, The Rotary Club of Medford for the second year held its "Rotary Lights Up Medford" campaign at the Medford Senior Center. Rotarians, in keeping with their motto "Service Above Self", handed out energy efficient compact fluorescent light bulbs to replace incandescent light bulbs in our seniors' homes. Compact fluorescent light bulbs use 75% less energy and can save \$30 over the life of the bulb.

With assistance from The Council of Aging, senior residents filled out applications for up to 5 free light bulbs per household. The light bulbs were distributed in 60 watt, 75 watt, and 90 watt equivalent versions. Rotarians, who volunteered their time, handed out over 700 light bulbs to 141 residents of Medford.



ROTARY EVENT “PLAYS FORWARD”

The rising cost of college tuition and the funky economy certainly have given some potential college students pause about acquiring a lot of debt through educational loans.

That's why Julia Kwolyk, 25, founded the **Play It Forward** Benefit Concert, an event she hopes will raise thousands of dollars for the Lawrence Rotary Scholarship Fund to be handed out in increments of \$1,500 to students from Lawrence, Andover, North Andover and Methuen.

Co-produced by Joe Spanos, head of TV production and marketing at Andover High School. **Play It Forward** will feature the bands **One Step Away** and **Apollo Sunshine**. The evening begins at 7:00 PM, Saturday, April 24, at the Andover High School Collins Center for the Performing Arts in Andover.

“I can see the cost of college skyrocket. And the economic muddy waters, wage cuts and job cuts are kinda scary,” Kwolyk said. “It's intimidating for students to face debt, an assumption based on my own personal experience. And I

didn't take advantage of local scholarships in my town. I want people to know what is available to them”

Kwolyk did get a Lawrence Rotary scholarship last year, so she could study in Vienna for six months. Now she wants to help give back to other students.

“Another big motivation behind organizing the event is that I am a singer, composer, and violinist who has spent a lot of time performing and wanted to get the experience of the managerial side of a

large scale event and to bring people together,” Kwolyk said.

“It has given me the opportunity to witness how the public responds to charities, as well as to meet more people in my own community,” she continued. I have learned a lot and am looking forward to seeing the bands play, as well as performing a couple of songs myself to open the show.”

She promises that the evening will be high energy and exciting. “The bands are on stage,” Kwolyk said.

A raffle of about 20 items ranging from gift certificates to Joe Fish, Tripoli Bakery, two pair of Red Sox tickets is also planned. Raffle tickets can be purchased at the event at a cost of three for \$2 and six for \$5.

FOUNDATION CORNER

CHARITABLE REMAINDER TRUST=GREAT TAX PLANNING

Are you aware that if you are selling some investment property or your business you are probably facing a very large capital gains tax. If it is your intention to invest the proceeds of such a sale for income purposes you will only earn income on what you have left after paying the tax. This can often reduce your investment and therefore your income by upwards of 35%. In an effort to promote private charities the Revenue laws provide that you may establish a Charitable Remainder Trust, whereby you give over the proceeds of the sale to your Charitable Trust. This eliminates the capital gains tax. Now your trust can earn income on 100% of the sale proceeds instead of +/- 65% of the sale. You establish how much you wish to receive as an annual annuity (there are reasonable limits of course, 6 or 7% perhaps). You and your spouse receive the income for your lifetimes and after you both die the principal of the trust goes to the charity(s) of your choice (such as The Rotary foundation Permanent Fund). There is also a charitable gift benefit as an added incentive. If you want you can use a portion of your extra income to purchase simple term insurance to replace the principal you have given away (your children can be the beneficiaries for example). This is a great way to increase your retirement income while doing something really good for others. This is not smoke and mirrors; this is a win-win opportunity. 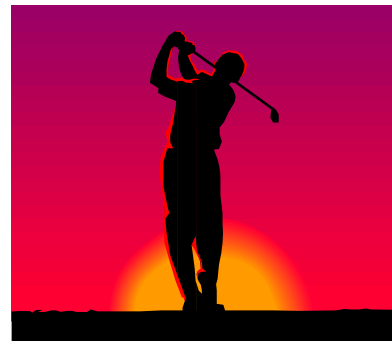

The Ultimate Community Service Project

Nice landing, Lindbergh! In this case no one was hurt except for an ego. Like many ventures, a little more training might have made a big difference....especially when you consider that most flight-based misadventures don't end so cheerfully. While some of us are advocates for keeping the "international" in Rotary International, clearly there are community service projects that never go out of style. Watching two dear friends bury their teenage children reminded us that one project stands out as literally a matter of life and death: Advanced Driver Training (ADT), especially as it relates to first year drivers.

Car crashes are the number one killer for Americans between the ages of 15-25. You'd need to combine reasons 2-9 to top it. Not drugs, not drinking. Most teen crashes do not involve drinking, although it's hard to tell from the newspapers. A staggering 43% of first year drivers crash. And please, nearly all of these are "crashes", not "accidents". Accidents are when meteors come out of the sky and hit the car, causing a crash. Or a lower control arm breaks, causing a crash, etc. In short, 93% are "pilot error". Can you imagine if airline pilots had a record like that?

Why do we have such an insanely high crash rate, and consequential death rate, verses the rest of the developed world? Money. Oh, we have plenty of it (over 40% of the world's wealth), we just refuse to spend it on training drivers. In Germany, for example, mandated driver's education program, including testing, costs roughly \$2,800. Expensive, yes, but their first year drivers are less than a tenth as likely to crash as our counterparts. I know of at least two families who'd gladly spend that to get their children back.

Mandating this kind of program is unrealistic, politically. There is, however, a remarkably cost effective advanced training program that achieves roughly 90% of the results of the German program at around 11% of the cost....\$299. And instead of taking 47 hours to complete, they do it in under a day. Too good to be true? Look again. ***InControl ADT*** has been operating their program for over eight years now, and has a documented 80% reduction in crashes by its 9,000 graduates. More importantly, not one graduate who has crashed has been seriously injured or killed....which means that statically the Reaper has been severely cheated.

If this program was operating in California, or Florida, it would be well worth the trip. We're talking about saving lives, lots of lives. But in fact, it's right here in Massachusetts and one of their training centers is in our District, North Andover. Not only is it the only certified advanced driver training program in the state, it's the only one in the United States. We're lucky.

But we're only lucky if we act. The old phrase, "Luck is When Opportunity Meets Preparation" is key here. We have a great opportunity to make this a great community project and save lives, absolutely, positively. The timing is also ideal as spring and school vacation approaches.

GSE InBound Team Update

As of this writing, in just over 35 days the Group Study Exchange team from London, UK, will arrive for their one month stay as the guests of District 7930. As reminder, they will spend roughly one week in each of the "areas" as identified on the back of our directory. The first week will be in Area South, shaded in blue, stretching from Boston to Saugus. The second week they move to Area North, shaded in brown, including clubs from Salem, NH, down to Peabody, and east as far as Ipswich. On week three the team rotates to Area East, green colored on the District directory, which runs along the coast from Lynn to Rockport.
